


# BORDERTOWN HIGH SCHOOL

## Newsletter



Congratulations to our Year 12's who are in the final stages of completing their studies, with revision for exams and preparation well underway, as well as finalising their assignment work. In weeks 4 and 5 students will be sitting a range of exams to complete their assessments and hopefully achieve the results they had aimed for. I would like to congratulate all of the Year 12 students for their efforts this year, it is not easy and there have certainly been a range of distractions impacting their focus. These last few weeks will be worth it in the end and our school and community hope their hard work leads to them achieving their goals. Well done to all the parents of these students, Year 12 can bring on many stressful situations and imbalance into life at home, and your support is essential to how well your child achieves this year. Thank you as well to all of our staff for their efforts over the many years of teaching this current group of Year 12 students. While their teachers of SACE subjects do an amazing job, all staff have had input into their learning and development as young people.

Parent teacher interviews were held last week and it was great to see a number of parents taking the opportunity to speak to teachers about their child's learning. Interviews are important to follow up on concerns that you may have about progress in a particular subject, how to support your child with homework or specific concerns you may have. While we offer these interviews it would be great to see more parents attend in the future. I also encourage you to contact the school any time you have concerns or questions about your child's learning. If it is a subject specific concern, please ask to speak to the teacher of that subject, if it is a more general question, please speak to the coordinator of the year level. Miss Kirk and I are always willing to assist with your concerns and can also help work out who you should be speaking to.

This term we have started accessing the Headspace drop in sessions, with Jin from Headspace in Mt Gambier visiting each Tuesday to support our students. Last week Jin visited a number of classrooms to introduce herself and get to know students a little more. Students are encouraged to drop in and see Jin when she is on site and get some support. As parents, if you feel your child needs some support please encourage them to visit Jin, or reach out to any of our leaders to help encourage or support your child to attend a Headspace session. We also are able to refer students for more regular support from Headspace if needed.

Last week Encounter Youth visited our school, providing sessions for each year level on a range of topics including, alcohol, drugs, safe partying and vaping. They also held a parent session on Tuesday evening to support parents with some of this information and how they can support their children through these areas. Our staff will also be doing some training to understand more about vaping and its impact on young people.

Our next Pupil Free Day will be Friday 11th November. Staff will be discovering more about The Resilience Project, which we will be implementing in 2023. The Resilience Project focuses on student wellbeing and aims to improve positive mental health strategies in students, which supports the ability of individuals to improve their learning. We will also be upskilling staff in understanding about the effects of vaping to better support young people in this area.

Andrew researched the life of Archie Roach after his passing, while Ricky and Nathan have been learning more about Raukkan. These posters are being displayed in the front office area for others to learn more about the research these students have undertaken.

We have noticed a number of students arriving at school early, at times as early as 8.00am. Andrew has completed a project of Archie Roach, which depicts his life from homelessness to becoming an iconic Australian Artist. Andrew learnt about Archie's life as an Australian stolen generation child to meeting his soul mate Ruby Hunter. They wrote songs and performed together. Archie's break came when he was discovered by Paul Connolly - guitarist for Paul Kelly. The message of Archie's story is one of hope and resilience.

Nathan and Ricky collaborated on a project to learn about Raukkan, formally known as Point Mcleay mission. They learnt about the cultural significance of Raukkan and the Coorong environment to the Ngarrindjeri people and also about David Unaipon who is recognised on our Fifty Dollar note. The students enjoyed researching and putting projects together.



## Relay For Life

Relay for life is an event held every 2 years, in which people raise money for cancer research. Leading up to the event teams raise money however they see fit. When the event date rolls around all the teams will walk laps around the Bordertown Football oval. Walking the laps doesn't raise money but symbolises the fight against cancer. This year Relay for Life was held on the 29th and 30th of October, running from 2pm on Saturday to 9am on Sunday.

The Bordertown High School SRC members thought that it would be a good idea to put together a team to participate in the event, and to help fundraise for a great cause. A link was put on the school Facebook page, where we raised almost \$1,400 from donations. The weekend before the event took place, we had a raffle to raise money. We had a number of prizes donated from local businesses, these included four bakery vouchers, one butchers voucher, one fruit and veg voucher, two meat boxes of assorted cuts from JBS and a gift basket. Thanks to all these prizes we raised \$232 to donate to Relay for Life. Other than the raffle we also held a casual day in which people put on their favourite sports colours, this helped us raise another \$240 to go to relay for life.

On the day, as it was close to Halloween, you could see people dressed up in costumes hoping to win the best-dressed award. The opening ceremony was held at 2pm and we were asked to pick two people to go up to read the Relay for Life Oath. Adrian Saraosos and Noah Nankivell represented our school team for this. After the opening ceremony had ended, the first lap started with survivors and carers leading the group, followed by all the team. Once the first lap had finished, the survivors and carers went over to the netball courts while the teams continued to do laps. At 5pm there were games held where each team could earn points by winning, unfortunately, our team was eliminated in the second round. At 6pm there was a trick or treat event held for people to do as Halloween was coming up. At 8pm a candlelight ceremony was held where all teams were asked to stop walking and have a minute of silence to pay our respects to those who we have lost to cancer. Later at night, there was a Dance-a-thon held where people could get more points for their team. Throughout the night there was a jeopardy style trivia which you could also get points for your teams. From midnight until morning, we were responsible for the midnight games which involved mini hurdles, skipping weaving through cones and more, this was to help get rid of the boredom at night for the people who were walking.

At 9am the event ended with a closing ceremony to thank everyone for being there and supporting cancer research and raising the amount that we had by the end of the event there had been a total of \$37,000 raised to go towards cancer research. Putting something like a Relay for Life team together took a lot of effort, so we are thankful to all the students, parents and teachers who volunteered their time to walk, help set up/pack up and supervise students.

# Year 7 Science News

After enduring a predominantly theory-based topic of Habitats and Interactions, students have eagerly grasped the opportunity to get back into the lab, conducting experiments and learning science by doing science. Year 7 science for the rest of the term will focus on developing our understanding of forces. Students were given the task of balancing an empty soft drink can on its rim. Sounds easy, right? Turns out, we needed a little extra help to achieve our aim. Fortunately, we were able to engage our brilliant science brains and work a little magic to modify our can and make it balance on its rim (and no, we did not use glue!).



During our practical investigation we made lego cars and learnt about inertia by recording what happened to our plasticine crash test people when the motion of the lego car was suddenly stopped.

Students engaged with the STEM Engineering processes of ask, imagine, plan, create, test, and improve as they designed and built cars, then altered their designs to strengthen their investigation results. We theorized why the plasticine person didn't stop with the motion of the car and discovered that because an object in motion tends to want to stay in motion, while the car's motion is blocked by the wall (or another car) the person continues their forwards movement.

Carrie Soto is fierce, and her determination to win at any cost has not made her popular.







