Year 10 Coastal Trip





As part of the Year 10 Geography course, we are studying the environmental management of coasts as a topic. To make the content more meaningful, we conducted a field trip to Kingston and Robe on Thursday 9th November, where coastal processes and human interaction were studied.

The students traveled by coach, leaving Bordertown High School at 7:00am and returned to the school around 5:00pm.

The trip was to occur regardless of the weather; therefore, students needed to be prepared for this but to their good fortune, the sun was out and there was the smallest of breezes. As part of this trip, students were asked to used devices (phones), cameras, etc. to take photos and record their results. They had to take 'selfies' or be in photos to show attendance. Students used these images to further their responses in their final assessment.

Students enjoyed a lunch break in Robe, choosing a variety of food options or alternatively some retail therapy.

YR 10 COASTAL TRIP









Year 7 Science

This term our year 7 scientists are learning about forces. We began the term with a little bit of magic engaging motor skills, science and teamwork to create a line of cans that could balance without tipping over.

This led to our crash test dummies practical investigation where students used their STEM skills to build a Lego car that could withstand an impact at the bottom of a ramp. Using the iPads, students created slow motion videos of their collisions to explore inertia (the tendency of an object to resist changes in motion) as our plasticine people got thrown out of the cars.

We then entered the world of contact and non-contact forces, starting with friction. We used spring balances to measure force in Newtons while investigating the connections between friction and mass. This engaged our math skills as we used different masses to create the desired total mass for our spring balance to measure, then made a line graph to display our findings.

Gravity, the force of attraction between two masses, was next on our list of things to discover. We theorized and explored the fall time of common objects on Earth. Budget restrictions left us watching a video (instead of getting on the Magic School Bus) of an astronaut dropping a hammer and feather on the Moon. Our newfound appreciation of air resistance was put to the test when we designed and created cardboard helicopters which we tested, modified and tested again.

Our exploration of magnetic and electric fields resulted in some fascinating iron filing art to show the magnetic field of a bar magnet. We then did some testing around magnetic shields, during which the most challenging part was holding our hands steady and not knocking down the floating paperclip.

As the academic year draws to a close, our year 7 scientists are now studying for their final test on this learning area. I wish them all the best in their science learning in the future.





Geography News - Food Security

Over a two week period students from 9B Geography visited Foodland to apply knowledge surrounding food security and the variance wealth provides.

On their first visit, students worked in pairs to compare large and extravagant budgets to that of limited and considerably smaller budgets. Students were tasked with creating a week's menu to the best of their ability. They were allocated varying budgets to compare the items bought and discuss the impact price had on quality, variety and other issues surrounding food security.


While at Foodland, students set about filling their fridge. They were directed to cater for three meals a day, ensuring dietary requirements were met. Students found variety the biggest issue while budgeting and were shocked to learn Hawaiian Pizza, Meatlover's Pizza and Supreme Pizza does not mean variety or nutrition.

Whilst at Foodland for the second week, students were asked to look beyond food and at other items that impact food security. Students were asked to consider pet ownership, time needed to prepare and cook food, as well as hygiene needs and medicines. They were to look at aisle width, product placement, access and safety along with difficulties faced transporting items.

Students were also asked to consider growing families, as well as major expenses incurred and how they might impact food security.

On Monday the 4th December, the BHS Girls cricket team played Maitland Lutheran at St Ignatius in the semi-final of the School Sport SA 7-9 Girls T20 Cricket Competition.

Captain Mia Richards won the toss and elected to bat on a warm sunny morning. Lara Weise and Kyla Pilgrim put on a 37 run opening partnership, playing some good shots and running well between the wickets before Lara was bowled just before drinks, another three wickets fell shortly after, before Zoe Harvey and Mia Richards steadied the innings to get to 5/56 before a few wickets fell at the end in search of quick runs. BHS finished the allotted overs 6/70. Lara top scoring with 19, Kyla 11, Mia 10 and Zoe 8.

In reply, Maitland Lutheran finished 2/63. The girls fielded well, and Kyla took an important catch at mid-on to dismiss their set opener off the bowling of Ada Blackwell, who finished with 2/5. BHS had won and were through to the final against Cabra College, who had defeated St Ignatius in the other semi-final.

Mia again won the toss and elected to bat first. Cabra's opening bowlers caused us some issues and we found ourselves 4/14 in the 5th over. Zoe Harvey had provided the only highlights with some nicely timed drives down the ground before being dismissed for 4. Our first drop Emma, managed to stay in on a wicket which was cracking up under the heat, playing a nice drive through the covers for 3, before being caught for 6. Mia Richards also played a swat down the ground for our only boundary before being dismissed for 7. BHS were all out, however, for 41 in the 13th over, two of the last 3 wickets getting stumped by some handy glovework by their keeper.


